Mr. Owen graduated with the last class of Orlando Senior High School in 1952 before the school became a Junior High. He played French horn in Navy Bands during his four-year military service.

He earned a music degree at Stetson University and taught Instrumental and Choral music in Florida schools until 1989. During his teaching years, he also served as Choir Director at several churches and sang with the Camerata and Encore Opera Choruses. As a member of the Florida Vocal Association (FVA) he was a district judge for FVA Choruses. In 1987 he was honored to be the director of the All-State Junior High Chorus at the MENC Convention in Tampa, Florida. In 2015 he was inducted into the FVA Hall of Fame.

Having lived in Florida his entire life and considering himself a "Florida boy", in December 2005 he and his mother moved to Alabama to be nearer his brother and sister-in-law. He joined First Baptist Church of Athens and directed the Jubilation Singers (Senior Adults Choir) for many years. He not only enjoyed music, but also boating (having taken numerous trips on Florida Boat-a-cades and enjoying Mississippi River Boat Cruises) as well as driving his antique cars to local car shows.

Mr. Owen is survived by his brother Randall H. "Doc" Owen (Nell) of Madison. He was preceded in death by his father Albert Tyrrell Owen and his mother Freddie May Owen.

Services were held at Spry Funeral Home, Athens, Alabama on Monday, June 9 with Dr. Edwin Jenkins officiating. His body will be interred in the family plot at Rose Hill Cemetery in Kissimmee, Florida.


Mr. Larry Dewayne Turner was born on February 17, 1949 in Athens, Alabama. He departed this life on May 27, 2025.








The feature car this issue belongs to Floyd M. "Rusty Parker of Florence, Alabama, Rusty's Packard, pictured below, won the Totcky Trophy for the best restored car in the North Alabama Region for 1970 and won a National first prize at the 1970 Pensacola AACA National Meet.

The car is a 1955 Packard Dietrich Phaeton Standard 8 on a 135" wheelbase. The car was purchased from the estate of the late Jerry Gage a millionaire from Tupelo, Mississippi. Jerry got the car while living is Phoenix, Arizona from his friend Bill Harrah. It sounds like an Errol Flynn story, but club members in Mississippi say the car actually did belong to Bill Harrah of Reno fame. The car had only 27,1000 miles when purchased and was an easy restoration. Leonard Brown did the paint after the car was stripped and in prime. The car was driven to Cowan in January completely stripped except for motor, radiator and cowl. After painting, the car and pieces were brought home and the painted pieces were placed in the living room for the duration. Bert Morelock did the striping after the car was again assembled. Approximately \$3000.00 was spent, on materials for restoration. An interesting feature is the set of dual Buell air horns on the outside of the hood. These horns were installed when the car was originally equipped as authenticated by the Packard expert, Bob Turnquist. Jean and I feel that the car may not be the best 1935 classic restoration in the U.S., but are sure that when purchased it was the best preserved Packard to be found anywhere.



## Cruising And Playing The Radio

Maybe it was Chuck Berry who best described the joy of driving an automobile when he sang, "Cruising and playing the radio. With no particular place to go." At least since WWII, the radio has been an integral part of the freedom offered to us by the automobile. In the early 1990s I tried to describe "cruising and playing the radio" to a visiting English friend, but he couldn't comprehend it. It was Friday night. So, we walked the few blocks from my house to downtown Lincolnton, N.C. where there were hundreds of teenagers cruising in their cars. This prompted two questions from the Englishman: "What is the purpose of all this?" and "Why do they play their radios so loud?" When I tried to explain that it was a unique part of American culture thanks to "freedom of the road", he smiled and said, "Well, all these young people sure seem to be enjoying themselves!"

I grew up "cruising and playing the radio". The year I was born was when the 45 rpm record was introduced by RCA Victor. The year I learned to drive the 8-track player was becoming the big thing. I still have a box of 8-track tapes in the garage, but the player hanging under the dash is long gone.

Let's share some important events in our history of cruising and playing the radio:

- In the 1920s and 1930s in-car radios were being introduced. They were expensive, adding about 25% to the price of a Model A. The top song of 1930 was "Happy Days Are Here Again".
- In 1952, even though practically all stations were broadcasting in AM, the first in-car FM radio became available thanks to Blaupunkt. The top song was "Blue Tango".
- In 1963 vacuum tubes were replaced with transistors and car radios became "solid state". The top song was "Surfin' USA".
- In 1965 8-track players became available. Over the next several years 8-track players were added to many cars. The top song was "Wooly Bully".
- By 1969 cars added stereo to their sound system, where the tuner amplified two channels, not just one. The top song was "Sugar, Sugar".
- In 1970 companies like Alpine and Pioneer sought to solve our problem of the 8-track player eating up the tape with cassette tapes. With the advent of cassette tapes, we could now play "my music" thanks to a "Mix Tape". The top song was "Bridge Over Troubled Waters".
- By 1982 Bose offered the first Premium Stereo System teaming up with GM's Delco to offer it as an option in Oldsmobiles, Buicks, and Cadillacs. The top song was "Physical".
- By 1984 Sony introduced an in-dash CD player. The top song was "Careless Whisper".

Now, buttons and dials have been replaced by touch screens and Bluetooth. If you don't know what that is, ask your grandchildren. Then, take them on a cruise in your "old car". If it has a radio, let them turn it up loud.


