## Congressional Review Acts / Signed!

In July 2025, President Trump signed three pieces of legislation, H.J. Res 87, H.J. Res 88 and H.J. Res 89, which revoke waivers granted to the State of California, allowing it to set its own emissions standards. These resolutions were passed by the U.S. Congress in recent months and are a strong sign of the commitment by some in Washington D.C., to push back against the attack on the internal combustion engine.

Support for actions like this has been a key part of the Motorcycle Riders Foundation's (MRF) legislative agenda. During the recent Bikers Inside the Beltway event, MRF members spent time advocating for the passage of these bills in the U.S. Senate, where they had temporarily stalled after being passed by the U.S. House earlier in the year. Additionally, the MRF wishes to thank the thousands of you who answered recent online Calls to Action on this topic.

A process known as the Congressional Review Act was the mechanism by which these bills were passed. Because of the unique way they moved through Congress, opponents are already signaling their intent to file legal challenges. While this battle will now likely continue in the courts, it is nevertheless important to celebrate this victory for the survival of the internal combustion engine. The fight will go on... and the MRF will be here for that fight.

NAR member, David Hoha, sent this to AACA as they have a reason to be in this fight too. Every member of the NAR/AAACA should be calling their US Senators and US Representatives to push these bills through to law. The Right to Repair and Modify our vehicles is being waged at a federal level. H.R 1556 / S. 1379 are the two bills that need support to maintain our right to repair and modify. We at the Motorcycle Riders Foundation have succeeded in getting the California Air Resources Board (CARB) shut down as the EPA is trying to force all electric vehicles by 2035.

MRF is still pushing H.R. 2165, H.R 2218 / S. 995, S.1072 to fully protect the Internal Combustion Engine. Also the issue with 15% Ethanol is still being fought through Consumer protection and Fuel Transparency. We are not against 15% although it will seriously harm all current combustion engines but we need to make sure that 10% Ethanol and NON-Ethanol fuels stay available. These are issues that affect AACA as well as everyone who has a combustion engine in some sort of vehicle.

#### Where's the Starter?

There have been many articles about where is the hidden gas filler, so what about starting the car? It's not just about where is the key fob.

Early cars, as we know, were crank started from the front of the engine. Set the timing, set the throttle or you will break your arm. So what came after that? I'm going to miss a few and get some years wrong, but stay with me.

In the 1930's, Chevrolet and others adopted a mechanical starter with a pedal above and to the right of the accelerator pedal to press and engage the starter gear and then the starter. A little difficult at times; left foot on the clutch, choke and throttle set, toe pushing the starter pedal while the heal of the right foot pumps the gas. Buick, on the other hand, chose an almost automatic starting system in 1936. With a switch on the carburetor, all you need to do was turn the ignition switch to on and press the accelerator pedal. Very convenient when you stall the car, as all you need to do is depress the clutch enough so it doesn't engage and the engine will restart. This was continued through 1960.

Starting a 1940's Studebaker with manual transmission, you press the clutch pedal to the floor and engage a button under the clutch to start it. If you own a 1954 Nash with automatic transmission, shift to Neutral and then pull the gearshift leaver towards you and the car will start. On many other cars of the 1940's, it was turn the key to the "on" position and then find the starter button somewhere on the dash.

Last on the list is the 1957-58 Chrysler products with automatic transmission. These were the push button shifters, but you had to push the Neutral button in farther to actuate the starter.

Now that you know how to start it, where does the gas go?






