# History of the AACA North Alabama Region

The North Alabama Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America originated as the Huntsville Antique Automobile Club in December of 1961. A discussion among three of our charter members resulted in placing an advertisement in the Redstone Arsenal weekly newspaper. This advertisement attracted four additional persons into the group. A meeting convened the following January, in which, officers were selected and the name of the club was chosen.

The club struggled along for the first six months, as most new clubs do, but a little publicity in the local paper made the club known to a few additional people interested in the hobby of preserving the history of the automobile. In the fall of 1962, the club voted to petition the Antique Automobile Club of America for a Charter. It was the general feeling of the members that affiliation with the National Club would enable us to make contact with surrounding Antique Automobile Clubs. With added activities the club would gain publicity and become better known. This has proven out over the past few years.

We were granted a Charter October 12, 1962, as the North Alabama Region; it was officially presented to us by Mr. Edgar Rohr as his first act as President on February 25, 1963. This club was the first Antique Automobile organization to become nationally affiliated in the State of Alabama.

The original fifteen persons who petitioned the AACA in the late Summer of 1962 for a charter included: Phil Woodbury, Gene S. Williams, Larry Lohmeyer, Dennis McCann, Herb McCarley, Jim Spencer, Jerry Peoples, David Gibson, Olan Chiles, Jim Asherbranner, Frank Barnett, Lowell Becraft, Toney Campbell, George Case, and Ernest Cross.

The first officers were Phil Woodbury, President; Ernest Cross, Vice President; Hank Lowers, Secretary-Treasurer. The same officers continued in office for all of. 1963 except Frank Barnett who was elected Treasurer and Hank Lowers continued as Secretary. Officers elected to serve for 1964 were:

Dennis McCann was continued as Regional Director through 1955 and 1966.

In 1966, the North Alabama Region hosted the Central Division National Fall Meet in Huntsville. We had finally arrived.

Today, the State of Alabama has five active AACA Regions. These Regions are the following: Birmingham (Dixie Region), Florence (Muscle Shoals Region), Huntsville (North Alabama Region), Mobile (Deep South Region), and Wetumpka (Central Alabama Region). The hobby of antique automobiling is well established in this State as a result of these clubs and their activities.



The 2023 Annual AACA Convention was quite a memorable event to attend.

The Regions and Chapters Dinner was hosted by J. C. Taylor Insurance Friday evening at the Doubletree by Hilton in Williamsburg, Virginia. 2022 AACA President, Mr. Wayne Tuck, opened the ceremonies by welcoming all AACA members. 2023 AACA President, Mr. Fred Trusty, spoke about AACA's "Looking Forward", and AACA's thoughts on future growth and expansion. National AACA activities were mentioned, along with Regions and Chapters shows. Regions Tours were strongly encouraged.

Saturday morning the Historic Virginia Peninsula Region AACA and the Colonial Virginia Model A Ford Club presented a wonderful vehicle display. The temperature was in the 40's, many spectators present.

Saturday evening the AACA presented its 87<sup>th</sup> Annual Awards Banquet. The dinner was delicious and the presentation of awards was overwhelming. AACA Vice President, Publications, Mr. Phillip Cole presented the Master Editor Award to many attending AACA Regions, of which I was honored to have been awarded for the NAR Spoke Folks newsletter. Michael Darnell can be proud that AACA selected the May 2022 Edition, which featured his 1971 Pontiac Firebird, as the award announcement display.

## A Roadside Rocket: Ardmore's I-65 Rocket to Come Down

A familiar roadside attraction just off Interstate 65 southbound at the Ardmore Welcome Center between Alabama and Tennessee could soon be taken down. The NASA rocket, a Saturn 1B space vehicle, has been a beacon to travelers for nearly 44 years. However, Alabama tourism officials and officials with Marshall Space Flight Center said damage to the rocket is too significant to repair. Their other concerns involve the safety of visitors if it is left in place. Both agree it wasn't intended to be outside for as long as it has been, more than 40 years.

The more than 224 foot rocket was installed at the Welcome Center in 1979 to pay homage to the area's role in the space program. The Saturn 1B was one of three Saturn rockets developed in Huntsville. It was designed for orbital training missions with both the Apollo spacecraft and the lunar module.

According to published reports at the time, the rocket was given to the state of Alabama by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) and the Smithsonian Institution's National Air and Space Museum with the understanding the state of Alabama has the resources to transport, erect and maintain the rocket. Ultimately, the Saturn 1B was on loan from the U.S. Space & Rocket Center and NASA.

According to Limestone County Archivist Rebekah Davis, a 15-vehicle convoy took two days to haul the rocket over its 32-mile path, the largest overland move of a space vehicle ever attempted at the time. Davis said utility workers had to move and raise electrical lines along the route, and law enforcement diverted traffic so the rocket could make its trek from Redstone Arsenal to the welcome center. The project was funded by a \$125,000 appropriation from the Alabama legislation, Davis said.

Since that time, it has been considered one of the area's most notable landmarks.





The Ardmore Welcome Center opened in 1977. Today, the welcome center is temporarily closed. According to officials with the Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT), plans are underway to demolish the current Welcome Center building and replace it with a new one. Bidding on the project is currently underway with construction expected to start thereafter, according to ALDOT officials.

Ardmore is a rare place because it is in two states, Alabama and Tennessee, and four counties, Lincoln County, Giles County, Limestone County and Madison County. That means Ardmore has two mayors and a town and city council with one police and fire department. So, like Ardmore, the longtime landmark is as important to some Tennesseans as it is to Alabamians. Many in Lincoln County, Tennessee, also work or have worked in the aeronautics industry.

Talks of removing the Saturn IB space vehicle bring back memories of family members working with Dr. Werhner von Braun, who directed research and development operations for the Army at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama, from 1950 until 1960 and served as director of George C. Marshall Space Flight Center from 1960 to 1970 with the creation of NASA. Dr. von Braun and his team made possible the landing of the first man on moon by the United States.

Fayetteville Attorney J. Stephen Broadway said his dad, Jimmy Broadway, was the project manager for NASA when the rocket was erected. Broadway said his kids know it as "PawPaw's rocket."

"He was so proud of it and that it was still standing all those years later," he said.

Others like Lincoln County Mayor Bill Newman remember traveling down I-65 in their youth and how seeing the rocket at the Welcome Center meant they were only half an hour from home. Many echoed his remarks and said, "It means home."

Limestone County Commission Chairman Collin Daly is a fourthgeneration farmer whose land is near the Ardmore Welcome Center. The rocket can be seen from his fields, and he said last week he would like to see the landmark saved. He said it represents not just Alabama, but the region and the United States.

Alabama Rep. Andy Whitt, R-Ardmore, posted on social media last Thursday night, "To permanently remove the rocket from North Alabama would be similar to removing the USS Alabama from Mobile Bay. This is our state's welcome mat. We will find common ground and a path









forward to ensure a rocket will continue to grace our skyline. I can assure you that conversations are being had at all levels of government and positive work is being done. I will 'fight the fight.' Whether providing shade on our family picnics to now a travel beacon when returning home from Montgomery, we will continue to honor our historic achievements."

On Friday the U.S. Space & Rocket Center said the Saturn IB and the structural support was deteriorated beyond repair. Estimated costs to disassemble and reconstruct the rocket are approximately \$7 million. Officials have said there is no guarantee it would withstand a restoration and the process would have to be done on-site by a team of experts because it could no longer be moved down I-65 for repairs.

U.S. Space & Rocket Center and NASA officials are working with local, state of Alabama and federal leaders to come up with a sustainable and affordable replacement.

"We are inspired by the community's passion for the rocket and the accomplishments it represents. Whether the rocket is replaced by a replica of the Saturn IB or another rocket, we're excited at the possibility for a new enduring emblem of Alabama's leadership in space exploration," Dr. Kimberly Robinson, CEO and executive director of the U.S. Space & Rocket Center, said.

"This is an opportunity to create a landmark that will withstand the test of time and serve as a symbol of Alabama's past and current role in space and technology," said Whitt, who chairs the House Committee on Economic Development and Tourism. "Everyone involved is working together to create the next great icon for our community, our state, and our nation."

Daly spoke with the Times on Friday. He said after the meeting with NASA and the U.S. Space & Rocket Center he is certain a solution can be found that reflects the voices of the area's citizens and the legacy that took man to the moon.

Broadway said he would be OK with something replacing the Saturn 1B. He understands there is not much that can be done about it.

"There's a lot of people upset because it has been a landmark for so long," Broadway said, adding when you really look at it from a dollar standpoint and a safety standpoint, it does make sense to replace it. "It's in pretty rough shape."

Broadway believes a replacement could help ease everyone's concerns.
