AACA Article / Winter Driving Stories

My best friend in High School and I both drove Crosleys, he had a 47 pickup and I had a 49 wagon. I ran tractor treads in the Winter if there was snow, so it limited my top speed. He piled cement blocks in the back of the pickup and used tire chains, if there was snow or ice. With the chains and blocks he could actually push snow with his bumper and keep going. We use to go out to the town park with his pickup and drive cross lots into the snow drifts and see how far we would get. When we couldn't get any further I would get out and stand on the back bumper and shift my weight back and forth to get traction. If we couldn't get across we would get out and the two of us would grab the back or the front and walk it sideways till we could get going again. Oh the follies (stupidity) of youth.

An even earlier Winter story was my first time driving on slippery roads. A friend of the family called one evening and asked my Dad if I could come out and help him move a piece of furniture. It had snowed but the roads had been plowed so my Dad sent me out in the family 60 Comet wagon. The friend lived about 4 miles out in the country. NW Ohio was part of the Black Swamp way back and has very deep ditches to drain the land. I turned off the main road onto a secondary and the back ended slid out. I thought that was fun so instead of doing as I had been instructed I kept the fish tailing going until I panicked and hit the brakes. I was instantly in a plowed field stuck, right across the road from a very deep ditch and dead center between two telephone poles. If I had to go off the road it could not have been a better place accept I couldn't get out. A car stopped and of course it was someone that knew me and my family so no getting away with anything. They gave me a ride home. I walk in and my Dad said something like why was I already back. I told him the stupid thing I had done. With no scolding he called a friend that owned the local Sunoco station and asked if he could borrow the tow truck. We drove out he hooked on to the front of the Comet and pulled me through the field and back on the road and he told me to go finish the moving job and to drive slower. I don't recall the incident ever coming up, I don't think my Mother ever found out and I never hit the brakes in a skid again.

My first car was a 1965 bug. It didn't do bad in the snow or ice. Me and my friend use to go drift bustin' out in the countryside. We would run the bug about 25-35 mph to hit a drift and go up and over it. I got pretty good at doing this until we hit one drift that was a good 3 foot high and about 12 foot long. We got stuck about half way through. It took us an hour getting the bug out. We decided to turn around and headed back to town. On the way we passes a snow plow a mile down the road. We turned back around and soon found the snow plow stuck in the same place we had been stuck. We helped the snow plow driver get out. He was very grateful for our help, as his radio had quit working and he was on his way to the garage to get it fixed. It took him 3 attempts to finally get through.

AACA Judging Guidelines

In preparation for the 2024 AACA / NAR Southeastern Fall Nationals on October 23-26 in Huntsville, AL, Dave Robertson, the NAR Fall Nationals Director suggested that the current AACA Judging Guidelines be published in Spoke Folks for the benefit of its members. Please remember, NAR members can register for judges training at any AACA National events they attend. Judges school at the NAR Southeastern Fall Nationals will be held from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Friday, October 25.

- AACA publishes the Official Judging Guidelines booklet every year. Also available online
- Judging guidelines & classifications are typically updated annually
- Objective of AACA judging process is to evaluate any vehicle based on 'As Delivered' condition, the same condition as the dealer would have prepared for delivery to the customer (See page 1-1)
 - Includes any feature, option or accessory shown in original factory catalog, parts book, sales literature or company directives
 - Any modifications that were added to conform to Federal law will not cause a point deduction (i.e., adding seat belts)
 - There is no penalty or premium for 'over-restoration' (i.e.. Better finish/gloss than original is over-restoration, non point deduction; chrome plating which was originally painted is non-authentic restoration, point(s) deduction)
 - No judges score(s) will be disclosed to an owner. Upon written request to the Chief Judge, the owner may get an area(s) that needs improvement
 - All vehicles must be pre-registered
 - All vehicles must have a 'working' fire extinguisher
- Judging is based on two (2) major components:
 - AUTHENTICITY vehicle needs to be 100% authentic based on the criteria above, and
 - CONDITION comprised on two (2) components
 - > Workmanship of the original condition or restoration of the original condition
 - > Maintenance of the vehicle
- · Vehicle are judged in the following major areas
- Exterior
- Interior
- Chassis
- Engine

AACA Judging Guidelines / Continued

Judging Classifications 2023

- Drivers Participation Class (DPC) entered vehicles will not point judged, for vehicles that members enjoy driving. Class allows for some non-authentic upgrades, but must look essentially as it did when it came from the factory
- Historic Preservation of Features (HPOF) entered vehicles will not point judged, for vehicles that are 'original' not restored. The class was established to encourage the saving and display of collector vehicles in their original, as manufactured, condition.
- Competition Judged Classes (140+ Classes, pages 4-7 thru 4-25) entered vehicles will be point judged, starting at 400 points
 - All judged classes are for 'Factory Original' vehicles except for Class 35C Pre-Certified Second Generation Collector Vehicle. This class required pre-certification from AACA HQ (page 4-16)
- DPC vehicles are not rigorously POINT JUDGED, they are EVALUATED according to DPC guidelines. See DPC Certification Form, 3-12. Owners must complete the form prior to judging/inspection. Upon approval, vehicle will be certified and awarded DPC Certification including a DPC board, chip and badge (page 4-5)
- HPOF vehicles are not rigorously POINT JUDGED, they are EVALUATED according to the HPOF guidelines. See HPOF Certification Form, 3-10. Owners must complete the form prior to judging/inspection. Upon approval, the vehicle will be certified and awarded HPOF Certification including HPOF board, badge and 'Original' chip (pages 4-3 & 4-4)
- Competition Judged Classes Any vehicle entered into a class will be 'point' judged in the four (4) main areas as shown on judging form. See Automobile Judging Form. Judging starting with a point total of 400 points. Each item on the judging form has been assigned a maximum point value. Deficiencies are deduced from this total. NO DEDUCTIONS FOR OVER RESTORATION.
- Three (3) categories of AACA Competition Judge Class Awards (see Family Tree of National Awards, Section 4 Appendix)
 - **Junior** vehicles are judged in this category at its' first National event. Will remain in this category until they win FIRST JUNIOR. 1* Junior winners receive a National First Prize badge and allow the vehicle then to compete at the next level, Senior category
 - 1st Junior awarded the highest score in a class, at or above the 365 point minimum, plus ALL other scoring within 10 points thereof and at or above the 365 minimum.
 - 2nd Junior vehicles that score 11 or more points below the top scoring 1* Junior and at or above 330 points
 - 3rd Junior vehicles that score 11 or more points below the top scoring 2nd Junior and at or above 295 points

AACA Judging Guidelines / Continued

- **Senior** the vehicle must have the highest score in the class with a minimum score of 375 points. Also any other vehicle scoring within 10 points of the highest score and at or above 375 will also be awarded a Senior award
 - > Senior award winners can then compete for a Preservation award, and Repeat Preservation
 - > All Senior Award winners are invited to the Grand Nationals
- AACA has rules on Change of Ownership of award-winning vehicles. (pages 4-29 thru 4-3 0)
- AACA has rules on Class Registration Changes (pages 4-31 thru 4-32)
 - AACA keeps all vehicles with owners information in their database
 - Each vehicle is assigned a separate and unique ID (page 3-4)
 - Owner can switch class only once every ten (10) years after winning an award
 - Specific restrictions on switching classes
- AACA has restrictions on vehicle information signs.
 - Only approved signs can be displayed or vehicle will not be judged
 - See AACA Custom Car Signs page. Contact Jon Curtis at AACA HQ jcurtis@aaca.ore
 - Leadtime is 4 weeks, cost ~\$50

Other Nationals Information

AACA requires a National Judging School be held at every Nationals event

- AACA encourages first time judges to attend the school (considered an Apprentice Judge)
- Each judge attending the school will earn one credit
- Following the school, Continuing Judges Education (CJE) breakouts sessions will be held. Judges earn one credit for attending a session
- Apprentice judges will continue their training by judging DPC vehicles on the show field. Process will be led by the Apprentice Judging Team Leader.
- Each judge earns one credit each time they 'judge'
- Judges are recognized at every Judges Breakfast held before the show. For 5 credits, a judge will be awarded the Senior Judge certificate. 10 credits earns Master Judge pin, board & certificate
- Awards continue every 25 points up to 400+

AACA requires a Judges Breakfast be held at every Nationals event

- Cost \$10 last year
- Each judge will be assigned a Team Captain and assigned their category assignment (i.e. chassis) and receive their individual category worksheet
- Judging is done in teams of four (4) judges plus a team captain.
- One judge will be responsible for their category on all cars judged
- After judging is complete, judging teams will transfer their individual category deductions to the Team Captains judging form
- No cost to register to be a judge, only cost is for the break fast.
- Register via aaca.org website or by completing the registration form in the Judges Newsletter

Important Judging Nationals Information

Our goal in this tri-fold is to arm you with pertinent and basic information to make your experience in registering your vehicle for a nationals much easier. We also hope to provide information to make your AACA Nationals experience enjoyable and stress free.

AACA Philosophy

The AACA philosophy is that there are 3 different types of vehicles: They were first original, then became drivers, and then restored back to original for class judging.

ORIGINAL - Historic Preservation of Original Features (HPOF). This is for un-restored, as delivered vehicles with factory approved accessories.

DRIVERS - Drivers Participation Class (DPC). This is for vehicles that may have had some restoration performed, been repainted and certain upgrades performed such as: seat belts, seat coverings, turn signals, stop lights, sealed beam/halogen headlamps, radial tires, alloy wheels of the same era and/or same vehicle manufacturer, radio upgrades, electrical upgrades, brake upgrades (bolt on), steering upgrades (bolt on), air conditioning, overdrive system and altered exhaust.

CLASS JUDGING - This is for restored vehicles that have been restored back to original with factory approved accessories and/or original vehicles that appear new.

SPECIAL INTEREST CLASS - A Display only, non-judged class. Vehicles such as: Celebrity, in movies or on TV, of historical significance, of innovative design.

Included is a listing of the standard AACA Judging Classes. For a more thorough explanation you can go to www.aaca.org and review the latest edition of the AACA Judging Guidelines.

NO STREETRODS, MODIFIEDS OR KIT CARS.

Registering

You have two ways to register, using the enclosed card or online at members.aaca.org. If you register online you must print it out and mail your payment in along with the registration printout. Many seasoned show participants use the online process.

Please, print legibly on registration cards!

AACA vehicle number is only for vehicles that have previously been shown. If this is the first time you are showing this particular vehicle leave the line blank.

Class numbers are listed on the back. If you are showing in an evaluated class (HPOF or DPC) they will not have a class number. Original and un-restored type vehicles are entered in the Historical Preservation of Original Features class (HPOF) and touring or driver vehicles are eligible for the Drivers Participation Class (DPC).

VIN is the vehicle identification number or serial number. Horsepower is necessary for Class 36 verification.

Important Judging Nationals Information

If you are showing a car in Class 24 (Race Car) the vehicle must be certified through the race car certification committee prior to the Nationals. Please contact National Headquarters for the certification application.

Please let us know if you are the new owner of a vehicle that has previously been shown in AACA, It will be necessary for you to call national headquarters at 717-534-1910 to make sure we have the vehicle removed from the previous owner's records. The judging guidelines will outline your options of starting fresh with our award program or continuing to the next award for which the vehicle qualifies.

If you and your spouse own vehicles individually it is important that you check the spouse section if the vehicle belongs to the spouse. The primary member is the one who gets the registration card. Our system does not allow it to be done any other way. So please mark the card accordingly.

If you have decided that you want to change between categories such as class judging to DPC remember that you can only change categories once in 10 years. Make your choices carefully as you cannot move in and out of class judging, DPC and HPOF. If you decide to restore your DPC or HPOF vehicle, you can then be entered in the Junior class by notifying AACA and removing the DPC or HPOF badge. Complete details are in our Judging Guidelines.

Prior to and at the Nationals

<u>Bring documentation for your vehicle!</u> Especially if it is limited production, unusual or has rare options.

Did you bring your fire extinguisher? It is mandatory!

Make sure you have your confirmation number for your hotel or motel.

Please read the Nationals tri-fold which has been sent to you or available online for instructions on trailer parking if needed. It may be easier for you to drop off your trailer prior to going to the hotel or registration area. Some hotels are not trailer friendly.

You can pick up your registration packet prior to show day at the place designated by the region. Usually at the host hotel or show site. If not, registration packets are available on the day of the show as you drive into the venue.

Complete the judging or evaluation sheet found in your registration packet, sign it and leave on driver's seat.

Place the windshield card beneath your wiper or on windshield on vehicles so equipped. Otherwise make it accessible and visible.

Remove items from trunk and interior such as coolers, literature, etc. prior to judging (DPC vehicles are excluded). You may put them back in after judging if you wish.

Make sure fire extinguisher is visible.

Doors need to be unlocked, trunk open, windows up, convertible top up and hood open for judging. Please stay with your vehicle until it is judged/evaluated. Some vehicles it may be necessary to keep hoods closed etc. but the judges will need YOU to open them during their evaluation.

Important Judging Nationals Information

Helpful hint: If you have a vehicle that is rare, limited production and/or unusual options you may want to mention to the team captain that you have your documentation if a question of authenticity arises. Remember: It must be FACTORY documentation.

If this is the first time you have shown a vehicle plan on attending the Owner's Briefing which is usually around 9:30 AM in the morning of the show. If you have a problem there will be people at the host region and AACA national officials there to help you. You will also find out that fellow AACA members will be glad to show you the ropes.

Remember: You are not allowed to remove your vehicle until 3:00 PM or when dismissed by the chief judge early due to inclement weather.

If you did not receive the award you are seeking, a highlighted form of deductions is available by writing to the VP of Judging. Self-addressed, stamped envelope required. VP of Judging address can be found in the "Antique Automobile' Magazine.
