On March 11, 1927, the first recorded armored truck robbery in the United States took place near Pittsburgh. Orchestrated by the Flatheads Gang, the heist involved detonating a mine beneath a Brinks armored truck, disabling it and seriously injuring the guards. The gang made off with over \$100,000, and the incident forced security firms and law enforcement to rethink armored vehicle protection—ushering in a new era of criminal sophistication and tactical prevention.

Meanwhile, 2025 is officially rolling for NAR! We kicked things off in a big way with our February dinner meeting at Phil Sandoval's, where we had a fantastic turnout and filled our meeting area to capacity. How to change password and update profile


- 1. Click the My Profile tab in the upper menu bar.

- **3.** You can update the information in your profile. You control the information you want to share.


Click the **Help** tab in the upper menu bar. This can answer most any question you may have.



Dollars and Sense

NAR Auto Antiquarian News - March 1968

Let's take a look at antique automobiles from that hard realistic viewpoint, MONEY AND HORSESENSE. All of the early cars have great artistic attraction. Some tend to fit each of us better than others and other years are pleasing to almost all of us. We are also all aware of the tremendous pleasure in restoring, owning, and being around the antique motorcar. There are also many of us who have certain sentimental attachments to certain autos. The other area of interest is the fact that these elderly mechanical contraptions have intrinsic value. Every hour you put into a vehicle and each part you buy has value, and should be weighed carefully. Some cars depreciate while others grow in value. These factors are what I think we should now view and consider anew.

In the consideration of the type of automobile to restore, the amount of money available to make your initial purchase, and money supply must be known. Most people start with from \$100.00 to \$1,000.00 on their first car and add as required and available.

The availability of cars is not in any way the crux of the problem. There are over 100 antique autos for sale less than 20 miles from Huntsville. I know of over 50 listed Classics for sale in this area. Anything you desire is available, all you have to do is find it. This is a real challenge to most and requires only good detective work. Within a day's drive almost anything is available from a 1920 Model "T" Ford" with 2000 actual miles to a 1927 Rolls-Royce Limousine in mint condition. I've found two locations with over 10 Fords (T's, A's, 32-34's), complete, unrestored and for sale by a non-restorer.

Let's divide all antique autos into four loose groups:

- 1. Model "A" and "T" Fords
- 2. Pioneer and Vintage Cars
- 3. Production and Special Interest
- 4. Classics

Next, let's assume we buy an example from each group in average, unrestored condition and a fairly interesting specimen. We must also take into account the experience background of the restorer. The ability to do the mechanical rebuilding, body work, interior wood work, upholstery work, painting, and electroplating is not possessed by most of us. The cost of facilities alone for these various operations can be prohibitive. If you have the talent to do most of your own work you can pay for all the basic tools and painting equipment on your first car with the money saved in doing this work yourself. Let's further group the restorers and label them HOBBIST (with the ability to do everything except the chrome plating and upholstery work) and CONTRACTOR (who does only disassembly, cleaning, chassis painting, minor mechanical work and reassembly). A third group who is really not a restorer is the INVESTOR who has the car restored from start to finish by a professional.

The following comparison chart was made to show as fairly as possible the cost and labor of restoring example cars from each group. The cars were picked, on the basis of information available. Four antique auto price guides were used to establish these prices. You will notice the restored prices are not maximum or HMN asking prices, but confirmed average sales prices. For example, the 1950 Ford prices are based, on 68 cars and 2 separate computer polls. Each group has economic advantages as you can see from the comparison chart. The Ford class has good potential with a low initial investment. The early cars require less cash and time to restore and have good value growth. Production cars are the easiest to locate and have the lowest initial cost but realize the slowest growth. The Classic cars offer as much enjoyment as the other groups, but have far better economic potential.

Classics require more work, but not more quality, for excellent workmanship is not relative and is the same on a 1926 model "T" Ford as a 1934 Lincoln. Parts are harder to find, but if we restrict our parts to authentic (original) items and realize, this is part of the challenge, practically anything can be found.

Do you remember when Model "A" Roadsters were \$75.00 and 1931 Chryslers top price was \$100.00 ????? Will a 1931 Cadillac Phaeton bring \$50,000.00 or a 1902 curved dash Olds actually sell for \$22,000.00 in 1925 ???? Have you ever thought about the fact that most of our antique autos will outlive us ???? Let's make the most of our time from a really different hobby, one that not only gives tremendous pleasure, but can add greatly to our financial security.

Don't Do That

Do not restore your car. Your costs will far exceed the value of the finished product

DON'T DO THAT.

I've seen and heard it a thousand times. Someone, not always a novice, will seek advice on what to do with a project car they've either discovered, inherited, or have been thinking about purchasing. Almost without fail, a person who feels they have influence will quickly chime in: "Don't restore it. You'll end up with way more money in your project than it's worth."

I often wonder if similar situations occur outside our antique car hobby. Say, for instance, a group of friends are standing around and out of the blue one of them declares, "I'm thinking of taking up golf. What do you all think?" Taking a page from the book of the influential advisor above, the first response would be, "Don't do it. Your costs will far exceed the value of those score cards at the end of each round." After all, there are clubs to buy, special shoes to wear, appropriate (or inappropriate) outerwear, country club fees, tee-time fees, caddy fees, golf cart rental (or purchase, along with a trailer), 19th-hole spending, etc. The retail value of each of those items is practically nothing once they've left the shelf, with little or no possibility of them being worth anything within our lifetime.

Here's my take: It's a hobby. For as long as I've been in the antique car hobby, six decades now, it's been just that, a hobby. Hobbies contribute to the benefit of not only the person involved, but the people around them. Fellowship is enriched as individuals are fulfilled, have more to offer and share with family, friends and colleagues. It's not about the end result, it's about the journey, the friendships, the camaraderie, the relationships, the pride in craftsmanship, and most of all, the memories. It's also about spending time with family, twisting wrenches and sharing the driving with sons, daughters, grandparents, and your spouse.

Just as golf is for the majority of those who commit time to it. Should we even try to quantify the enrichment received in having a hobby? In my opinion, no. With our cars we spend years restoring, maintaining and cleaning our pride and joy, taking it to shows and/or tours all around the country, constantly trying to make it look as nice as possible if not trying to improve its appearance. In fact, as we're raising a glass with great friends at the end of a fun day on the road or on the show field, our spirits are raised as well. Priceless.

In my opinion, the pursuit of any hobby is not worthwhile if the only goal is to become better off financially.

Think of the relationships forged through AACA as you consider donating to the AACA Building Fund. The Antique Automobile Club of America is a club devoted to help you enjoy your hobby in ways in which you could never do on your own. It's well worth it, both for you and the hobby.


