1922 Willys-Knight Model 20A Roadster – HPOF

Having a completely original vehicle over 100 years old and visibly showing age and it's 50-year storage in an open, several hundred-year-old stone barn (circa 1730), to be nominated for the NAR Thomas Totcky Award was quite surprising. Then to be awarded that honor was amazing. I believe I was by far the most surprised individual in the NAR dinner banquet room.

When NAR decided to host an AACA national show, I wanted to have a vehicle on the field but I don't own a national show level vehicle. My love is in the activities with the restoration of a vehicle to a nice (#3 or #4 level) driver vehicle, not to potential award show level. Touring is my favored activity as I feel that vehicles are made to be driven. My primary interests at the annual car show at Hershey are the very early 1900's (1900 – 1920), the 1920 and early 1930's classics, and the HPOF (Historic Preservation of Features, soon to be termed Original). As such, I decided to devote my efforts to preparing a couple of completely original 1920s Willys-Knights, a 1922 W-K model 20A roadster and a 1928 W-K model 66A sedan, for the HPOF evaluation. The W-K 66A sedan needed minimal effort, merely clean up, polish, and wax. I had already replaced a broken sleeve in the engine, resolved other engine issues, addressed an over-heating problem, and the heavy clean-up. The WK 20A roadster took considerable effort. The goal was to not only have the vehicles on the show field but to drive them safely from home to the show field and back.

A bit of history on the vehicle. An early Willys-Overland-Knight Registry member (#117) had developed in the late 1940s and early 1950s a collection of 14 W-Ks and stored them in a stone barn in Pennsylvania. In the 1990's he was in his mid-90's and he willed the property, the vehicles, and "tons of parts" to the Bucks County Historical Society. The society wanted to sell many of the vehicles and parts and turn the barn and house into a cultural center. The Michigan group of the W.O.K.R. learned about this at the annual Hershey meet. They stopped on the trip home to evaluate and assess the collection. An offer was extended and accepted and shortly thereafter the vehicles were in route to Michigan, Ohio, and Illinois. I eventually acquired the 1923 W-K sedan, a very early build using the W-K20A body and engine from that group. The roadster was not in that first batch retrieved but later negotiated and purchased by one of the retrieval team participants. The vehicles had been home to local critters for about 50 years.

This past summer a W.O.K.R. Michigan friend who was included in that retrieval was given a box of photos, one of which showed the roadster. He recognized as the roadster and gave me the photo. Based upon the last PA safety decal in the windshield, I think the photo (*Photo 1*) was taken about 1951. Also shown (*Photo 2*) is the vehicle in the background in its hibernation location in the barn.

I had known about this roadster for the years it was in Michigan. When first available for sale, the price point was way too high. The owner, a friend, went thru a serious and potentially life-threatening illness and didn't want his wife to be burdened by his extensive stash of parts and cars and eventually, a more rational sales price was offered and I accepted. I picked up the car in Michigan February – about 10" of snow and below zero temperature. I was able to store it in my son's garage in Michigan until spring.

From what I could determine reading on the internet about the HPOF evaluation criteria was that the judges like "patina" but not dirt and grime. Removal of the 100 plus years of grease, oil, and dirt without damaging the patina was a challenge. Normally I would simply use solvent, power wire brush, sand blast, or whatever was required to get back to the original surface. However, those processes would destroy the patina. The process became careful use of mild solvents, scrapers, fabric, scuff pads and a lot of time and elbow grease to clean the vehicle yet preserve the patina.

The major effort was that what was left of the top and side curtains, and hidem strips were located in the rear deck (aka trunk) of the vehicle in assorted pieces along with the top irons, all hiding amongst an almost overwhelming multitude of rodent nests. The top bows were off of the vehicle. The top irons had been painted - one a dull off white, the other brown primer. How to make the bows look unrestored satin black paint. Thankfully, the original top iron attachment fasteners were found in the vehicle. Determining the position of the top bows was trial and error, surface locations of the bows, lining up witness marks, nail holes in the bow wood to the holes in the top irons and attachment nails holes to the top attachment point. The bows at one time had been wrapped in a linen type material of which the mice had destroyed. Very little of that covering I remained intact. Those remains were put into a sandwich bag to show the judges why it was no longer on the bows. The top had a tear completely from side to side at the middle bow and a multitude of both large and smaller tears and missing material perpendicular to that tear. Simply touching or handling the material created additional tears. Black duct tape was used to address the smaller tears and missing material. I sewed a reinforcement piece about a foot wide and extending side to side for the primary tear and adjacent secondary tears on the underside of the top and camouflaged it with black paint. About a third of the back panel was simply missing and again black duct tape was used for fill (Photo 3). Wood filler was used to fill all the nail holes and deteriorated wood in the top bows so new nails would have something to grip. The top has some padding along both sides from front to back, another mouse treat. What was left of the padding assemblies was severely deteriorated and both ends missing. Once again, back to the walking foot sewing machine to resew along the length and add several inches to both ends of the pieces. Identifying left from right, top from bottom, and front from back was another challenge. Nail holes are well hidden in burlap. Crushed fibers and residue rust eventually provided adequate clues for their location. Once the top was installed, an iterative process, the next piece of the puzzle was the hidem strips. Length was the primary hint. The soft material of the interior of the vehicle was in similar condition with the securing nails long ago rusted away. At least size and shape were easy to identify their location. New nails to secure it.

Missing parts were the next issue. Local vandals in Pennsylvania had removed most of the moto-meters from the stored vehicles during the long hibernation. The fuse cover on the dash panel had been removed by the previous owner to use as a sample for reproduction and lost. I had some era moto-meters collected by my great-uncle in the early 1950s when he was restoring what is now my 1923 W-K model 64 touring. The red indicator fluid was not in the proper location. The per the manufacturer's documentation was to swing the moto-meter as though pitching a baseball until the fluid return to the base of the moto-meter. The process was effective but the number of pitches required became a bit painful. Gentle but persistent harassment of the previous owner proved effective and during the Old Car Festival time in Michigan I was able to retrieve the fuse cover.

Remaining tasks were the 1) electrical. All the lights and horn are now functional. 2) Fuel. The vacuum tank is functional. The fuel gauge located in the fuel tank is not. The tank was drained and refilled with fresh, non-ethanol fuel. 3) Cooling. The system was flushed and refilled. Water with rust inhibitor for summer operation. 4) Fluids. Engine oil change. Transmission and differential checked. 5) Brakes. They seem to work but the first trip, any trip, down my driveway in a vintage vehicle with narrow tires and only rear band brakes is an adventure.

The original intent when I procured the W-K 20A roadster was to get it into the restoration queue. With the current hobby emphasis and interest in original vehicles I plan on retaining both the roadster and the W-K 66A sedan in their original status condition. The AACA judge did indicate that soft materials such as the top and upholstery are understood by the AACA to deteriorate with age and can be replaced without penalty.

While at the show, I was approached by an individual who wished to do an article on the 1922 W-K 20A roadster. He did visit my home and farm, took numerous photos of several W-Ks (I have 10) and a day long interview. He announced on the W.O.K.R. Facebook page the publication of a 10-page article in the next issue of "Crankshaft".

The recognition of "retrieve from the dead" and showing the W-K (*Photo 4*) is very much appreciated and still quite surprising. Thank you. I have several more W-Ks slowly moving through the restoration process or are in the queue. Eventually, they will appear at a NAR car show.

Vintage Camping / AACA Rummage Box / Winter 2014

While attending another car club meeting recently an idea surfaced from its president that I had not thought about. The idea was to do a tour with a vintage vehicles and tent camping at night. Some of the elders groaned and he confessed that his idea was that this might be a way to get young people and young families involved with minimal costs.

This brought back memories of camping with my parents and grandparents as a child. We vacationed in the Ozarks one October, driving my Grandfather's surf green 1957 Chevrolet 210 4 door sedan. We camped in tents my Grandmother and Mother had made from heavy canvas, used Coleman lanterns and cooked on double and single burner camping stoves of the same brand.

We next camped in the back of a couple of our pickups with a tonneau covers. First was a 1958 Chevrolet Apache ½ ton pickup truck, and next was a 1959 Chevrolet El Camino. Since I was small and an only child, there was room for the three of us in the pickup box to sleep. I even recall, pleasantly now, pickup camping in the rain, but it may not have been so much fun at the time.

My first trip to Yellowstone was after I outgrew the pickup box, and we camped with our red 1959 El Camino and used the same homemade tent. On this trip to Yellowstone, was where my Dad first mentioned that a good replacement for the El Camino would be a Suburban Carryall as one of our 'camping neighbors' was using one. It was about a 1965 GMC. A number of years later we purchased our first of numerous Suburbans. They have fit the bill for many uses, including being used as a camper when needed. My grandparents 'graduated' from their tent camping to about a 15' teardrop shaped trailer; it had a folding couch and dinette, three burner gas stove, ice box (not a refrigerator) and both gas and electric lights, but no bathroom, so it still qualifies as camping to me.

This club president's idea I guess is not new as we did do some "vintage camping" ourselves as I recall. Dad, Mom and I drove our Model A to an old car get together with our luggage and tent in the back of a coupe and camping in a city park. More recently author Curt McConnell has described his camping experiences in series of magazine articles. He drove across the continent on as many gravel roads as he could find in his 1939 Plymouth.

For those not willing to rough it in a tent there are KOA cabins in various locations that we have found very nice.

I see at least several good things about camping with your antique car. It provides an excuse to get out in your car, you see interesting places, spend time with your children or grandchildren, build some good memories for them of the old cars and doing things, and it need not be cost prohibitive.
